

The block the family lives on is peaceful and quiet. On a nice day, from the front porch you can see a park, plenty of green trees, and neighborhood families out in their yards. The family's home stands out, as they painted their porch and front pillars bright green. Inside, the home is anything but quiet, with three, happy, playful young children.

"It's a lot of space," Florencia explained. Prior to owning their own home the five-person family rented the second floor of a small house, "now we have a lot of space for the kids to run. That also means more space for me to clean, but it's worth it."

Florencia decorated the home herself, and it has a warm, Caribbean feel to it, with light sandy walls and brightly colored accents. The inside of the home is impeccably clean, even with the chaos wreaked by three young boys. Despite hectic personal and professional lives - Florencia works nights as a server, Florencio full time at a recycling plant - they keep a very tidy home.

A tidy home is just one way the family shows their pride. Florencia explained that while renting, she only bought used furniture, now Florencia is investing in all new furniture.

Three of the biggest reasons Florencia and Florencio wanted to own a home, came in small packages: their children, Martin, Angel and Christian. According to Dr. Megan Sandel, pediatrician at Boston Medical Center, "housing can act like a **vaccine** to provide multiple long-lasting benefits" for children. After renting cramped apartments for many years, Florencia and Florencio understand this better than most. Their new home is not only a sanctuary for their three children,

but the children of cousins, nephews and neighbors. Safe, sanitary housing is a public health crisis, a crisis that affects our children, and ACTS families know this can be solved by affordable homeownership.

## KEY SUPPORTER SPOTLIGHT: US BANK

ACTS Housing has expanded and grown significantly since its founding nearly 25 years ago, but its DNA has remained the same. ## MEET THE ACTS TEAM: BECKY STONER

Before Becky Stoner had even heard of ACTS Housing, she was passionate about the importance of stable housing.

During college, Becky, ACTS Development and Marketing Manager, spent four consecutive

summers as a volunteer and then a staff member for the Appalachia Service Project in central Appalachia.

Becky did all manners of home repair for families and individuals living in substandard housing conditions. "The work was a simple as painting or patching holes and as complicated as building room additions onto trailers, fixing foundation issues and repairing roofs," she said. "I not only learned a great deal about construction

but saw firsthand the importance of safe, sanitary housing."

Becky then spent a year as a housing case manager with the Jesuit Volunteer Corps where she worked with men who were previously homeless – and now living in apartments – with a wide range of

supportive services. She then moved to Milwaukee to get her Masters degree in Public Service/ Nonprofit Administration at Marquette. She wrote her Master's thesis on dignity, homelessness and housing.

> All of those experiences helped make her transition to ACTS Housing a little less than a year ago a smooth and successful one.

"Becky had no desire to be part of a band-aid approach," said Michael Gosman, ACTS' executive director. "She wanted to help people solve their own problems and achieve on their own. That's what drew her to ACTS, and she brings a whole host of skills that we are lucky to have."

Becky fell in love with ACTS' unique model.

"Here was an organization that not only helped people secure housing but did so in the most dignified way possible," she said, "they reassure people they have the strength to get it done and support them through every twist and turn. What happens here on a daily basis is truly remarkable."

## State Farm Good Neighbors Blog Features ACTS Homeowner Madee

ACTS Housing surveyed more than 50 clients living in the city of Milwaukee.

83% said they felt safe in their neighborhoods.

3 out of 4 people also described their neighborhood as promising.

"When a vacant home in Madee's Milwaukee neighborhood was up for sale last year, his uncle told him and his brother to go for it. Madee's uncle is a contractor who works with ACTS Housing. He thought the young men would like living close to their parents.

The brothers went to the ACTS Housing raffle in June, 2015 thinking the home could be a fixer-upper. The young men believed this could be their opportunity to own a home. They put their names into the raffle and Madee ended up winning. Now all he had to do was come up with \$3500.

He was nervous about next steps but ACTS was by his side. ACTS Housing put together a deal for Madee to buy the house. They coached him about his finances and grants. They also recommended contractors and provided him a loan for repairs..."
